I am Associate Professor for Language Education at the University of York. I have served as an elected executive member of the British Association of Applied Linguistics (BAAL) and currently represent BAAL on the [Committee for Linguistics in Education](#), where I have played an active role in the current debates on the reshaping of the MFL GCSE in England. My research interests span language education at all levels, language education policy and ideology, and comparative approaches to international language education research. I have published widely on the UK language learning crisis and campaigned for concerted action to reverse the erosion of MFL study which this country has seen over recent decades. Having

worked as an MFL school teacher and at a wide range of HE institutions (including the Open University), I have an excellent understanding of the specific challenges facing MFL study and am keen to help reverse its decline.
